- This is a Request for Quotation (RFQ) for materials and services in connection with the U.S. District Court (USDC), District of New Mexico Cyclical Carpet Cleaning on the 2nd through 7th floors at the Pete V. Domenici (PVD) Courthouse at 333 Lomas Blvd, in Albuquerque, New Mexico, the Historical Courthouse at 421 Gold NW, in Albuquerque, and the Santiago E. Campos Courthouse, 106 So. Federal Place, in Santa Fe.
- All contractors must agree to the Terms and Conditions set out in Attachment A.
- A fixed price award from this RFQ will be made based on the lowest priced, technically acceptable offer. Technical specifications are listed in the Scope of Work section.
- Square footage indicated in specifications are approximates and field measurements are recommended. Changes cannot be made after contract is awarded.
- All work will be completed evenings.
- The Contractor must be willing to start work based on a Purchase Order. No down payments or advances will be allowed.
- Work will require unescorted access to judiciary facilities during evening and weekend hours. In accordance with Clause 3-3 (*Provisions, Clauses, Terms and Conditions Small Purchases*) Contractor employees working on this project are subject to security checks including fingerprinting and background investigations, and require access badges to work on the project. If the contractor is unable to supply a sufficient number of technically knowledgeable employees to work on this project, the judiciary may terminate the contract for default.
- Contractor must submit names of employees for security clearance within two weeks of contract award. Once security checks are completed, a time will be set up to issue badges to cleared employees.
- All quotes shall be accompanied by a *proposed* schedule of operations, including estimated times for completion of work.

- All quotes shall include a minimum of 12 emergency visits for spot cleaning. These visits shall encompass courthouses in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, and shall include the attempted cleaning of all types of spots and stains to the best of the contractor's ability.
- All quotes shall include a minimum of 100 chairs for upholstery cleaning. This number shall encompass courthouses in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, and shall include the attempted cleaning of all types of spots and stains to the best of the contractor's ability.
- Quotes shall be provided separately for each courthouse: 333 Lomas Blvd, NW, Albuquerque; 421 Gold NW, Albuquerque, and 106 South Federal Place, Santa Fe.

- The contractor must be willing to start work based on a Purchase Order. No down payments or advances will be allowed.

STATEMENT OF WORK

1. Description of Project

1.1 Introduction

To add to the life of carpeting installed throughout its courthouses in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, the U.S. District Court for the District of New Mexico (USDC) has developed a Cyclical Carpet Cleaning Maintenance plan. This plan consists of period cleaning of carpet and upholstery on a yearly basis.

1.2 Objectives

The project is part of the court's Cyclical Maintenance Plan, which aims to maintain the court's investment in carpet, furniture, drapery and other finishes on a regular basis. Through cyclical cleaning, the court wishes to extend the life of carpet throughout the courthouse.

1.3 Scope

The scope of the project includes hot water extraction of all carpet areas occupied by the USDC located at the Pete V. Domenici Courthouse, 333 Lomas Blvd. NW and 421 Gold, in Albuquerque, and the Santiago E. Campos Courthouse, 106 So. Federal Place, in Santa Fe, as defined in the Requirements Section. The project also includes upholstery cleaning and emergency spot cleaning.

1.4 Special Requirements

- Any contractor providing a quote for this project must have at least five years' experience with commercial level carpet cleaning and upholstery cleaning.
- Any contractor providing a quote must attend **Project Review/Field Measurement meetings on April 14 and 15, 2022** as noted above.

- A Supervisor or Project Manager must be assigned to the project to oversee and inspect all cleaning. The Supervisor/Project Manager will be expected to meet regularly with the USDC to review completed work.
- Any chemicals used during the carpet cleaning must be low odor and non-toxic.
- Due to security issues, all cleaning must be completed using portable units; truck units utilizing hoses will not be allowed.
- All quotes shall include a minimum of 12 emergency visits for spot cleaning. These visits shall encompass courthouses in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, and shall include the attempted cleaning of all types of spots and stains to the best of the contractor's ability and industry standard.
- All quotes shall include a minimum of 100 chairs for upholstery cleaning. This number shall encompass courthouses in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, and shall include the attempted cleaning of all types of spots and stains to the best of the contractor's ability and industry standard.
- All quotes shall include a second year option for the same work, priced separately from the original bid. Please see Provision 2-85A, Evaluation Inclusive of Options and Clause 2-90D, Option to Extend the Term of the Contract below.
- The contractor must be willing to start work based on a Purchase Order. No down payments or advances will be allowed.
- The contractor will work at the convenience of the court and must be available to complete the work evenings and weekends.
- The project schedule shall include cleaning at least one quadrant per floor per night at the 333 Lomas courthouse in Albuquerque, and one half floor per night at 421 Gold SW in Albuquerque, and at 106 So. Federal Place in Santa Fe, or as arranged by the court.
- Number of crew members shall be appropriate for amount of work to be completed on a given night.
- All crew members must receive a security clearance and obtain an access badge through the USDC prior to starting work on the project.
- The USDC & GSA must approve all materials used and workmanship performed for this project, and sign-off on completed work prior to payment.

2.0 Requirements

The work to be performed in connection with this project includes the following:

- One **hot-water extraction** of all carpeted areas occupied by the USDC in courthouses located in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, 333 Lomas & 421 Gold (ABQ), and 106 So. Federal Place, (SF), using portable equipment that can be transported into the building;
- One additional **low-moisture** cleaning for all carpeted areas occupied by the USDC on the 2nd floor at 333 Lomas, to be performed approximately 6 months after the hot water extraction, using portable equipment that can be transported into the building;
- Emergency spot cleaning within 24-48 hours of call as defined in the Special Requirements, using portable equipment that can be transported into the building;

- Upholstery cleaning as needed as defined in the Special Requirements, using portable equipment that can be transported into the building;
- Moving/replacing of chairs, chair mats, and small tables, to allow cleaning of all areas; desks, couches/lounge chairs, large tables to remain in place.
- Protective sheets shall be used under chairs and table feet if carpet is still wet; Chair mats should not be replaced if carpet is still wet.
- Any and all additional work and materials necessary to complete the carpet cleaning to meet industry and manufacturers standards and to the satisfaction and approval of the U.S. District Court; and
- Any and all additional work necessary to meet all local building, fire and safety codes, and the Terms and Conditions set out in Attachments A.

3.0 Deliverables

Table A, below, identifies the area of the carpet to be cleaned, the type of cleaning to be conducted (extraction or low moisture) and the approximate square footage. (Please note contractors should take field measurements to confirm square footage.)

3.1 Schedule for Performance and Delivery/Milestone Schedules

- A decision for awarding the contract will be made when funding is available.
- A Purchase Order for this project will be issued as soon as the project has been approved and the contract has been awarded.
- A detailed work schedule will be arranged once the contract is awarded and crews have received access badges.
- The work schedule shall include cleaning of at least one quadrant per floor per night in the Albuquerque courthouse and one half floor per night in Santa Fe. It is expected that the contractor shall work consecutive evenings to complete at least one floor per week in Albuquerque and all areas in Santa Fe within one week.
- Contractor may submit partial invoices for work completed once the area has been inspected and approved. Submitting of partial invoices shall be limited to once a week.

3.2 Review Period for Deliverable

The USDC will review each area with the Project Manager within 48 hours of completion of cleaning. Any discrepancies will be noted and must be addressed within 72 hours of the review.

3.3 Acceptance Criteria for Deliverables

The following criteria will be used to evaluate the performance of the contractor to meet the contract requirements:

- Carpet shall be clean and free of all stains and dirt to the best of contractor's ability and to industry standards.
- Carpet shall be dry within 12 hours of cleaning and no lingering chemical odors shall remain.
- Furniture will be protected by plastic covers to prevent water damage. Contractor shall return to remove all protective covers within 24 hours of initial cleaning.
- Upholstery will be free of all stains and dirt to the best of the contractor's ability and to industry standards.
- Upholstery shall be dry within 12 hours of cleaning.
- Chair mats that are moved to allow cleaning shall be placed in a position and area so that they do not fall on surrounding furniture. USDC will replace chair mats after carpet is dry.

4.0 Environment

The contract is divided into two projects in Albuquerque and Santa Fe. All work will be conducted in occupied space.

4.1 Locations for Performance

<u>Project 1</u> – Located at the Pete V. Domenici Courthouse, U.S. District Court, 333 Lomas Blvd, Albuquerque, New Mexico, 2-7 floors.

<u>Project 2</u> – Located at the Historical Courthouse, U.S. District Court, 421 Gold SW, Albuquerque, New Mexico, 2nd & 6th floors.

<u>Project 3</u> – Located at the Santiago E. Campos Courthouse, U.S. District Court, 106 South Federal Place, Santa Fe, New Mexico, 1-2 floors.

4.2 Government Furnished Property

No equipment or materials of any kind shall be provided by the USDC.

4.3 Contractor Furnished Material

The contractor must furnish all equipment and materials needed to perform the Scope of Work. No equipment or materials shall be stored at the courthouses during the duration of the project. All equipment and materials shall be removed each night after cleaning.

4.4. Access to Judiciary IT Networks

At no time shall the contractor have access to the Judiciary IT Network or Bench and Bar Wi-Fi.







- (4) The offeror uses the same compensation (wage and fringe benefits) plan for all service employees performing work under the contract as the offeror uses for these employees and for equivalent employees servicing commercial customers.
- (b) Certification by the offeror as to its compliance with respect to the contract also constitutes its certification as to compliance by its subcontractor if it subcontracts out the exempt services. If the offeror certifies to the conditions in paragraph (a) of this provision then <u>Clause 3-160</u>, <u>Service Contract Act of 1965</u>, as amended, will not be included in any resultant contract to this offeror.
- (c) If the offeror does not certify to the conditions in paragraph (a) of this provision—
 - (1) <u>Clause 3-225, Exemption from Application of the Service Contract Act to Contracts for Certain Services –</u>
 Requirements, will not be included in any resultant contract to this offeror; and
 - (2) The offeror shall notify the contracting officer as soon as possible if the contracting officer did not attach a Service Contract Act wage determination to the solicitation.
- (d) The contracting officer may not make an award to the offeror, if the offeror fails to execute the certification in paragraph (a) of this provision or to contact the Contracting Officer as required in paragraph (c) of this provision.

*This rate is to be used only when compensating employees for performance on an SCA-covered contract also covered by EO 13706 Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors. A contractor may not receive credit toward its SCA obligations for any paid sick leave provided pursuant to EO 13706.

VACATION: 2 weeks paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor 3 weeks after 10 years and 4 weeks after 15 years. Length of service includes the whole span of continuous service with the present contractor or successor wherever employed and with the predecessor contractors in the performance of similar work at the same Federal facility. (See 29 CFR 4.173)

THE OCCUPATIONS WHICH HAVE NUMBERED FOOTNOTES IN PARENTHESES RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING:

1) COMPUTER EMPLOYEES: Under the SCA at section 8(b) this wage determination does not apply to any employee who individually qualifies as a bona fide executive

administrative or professional employee as defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. Because most Computer System Analysts and Computer Programmers who are compensated at a rate not less than \$27.63 (or on a salary or fee basis at a rate not less than \$455 per week) an hour would likely qualify as exempt computer professionals (29 C.F.R. 541. 400) wage rates may not be listed on this wage determination for all occupations within those job families. In addition because this wage determination may not list a wage rate for some or all occupations within those job families if the survey data indicates that the prevailing wage rate for the occupation equals or exceeds \$27.63 per hour conformances may be necessary for certain nonexempt employees. For example if an individual employee is nonexempt but nevertheless performs duties within the scope of one of the Computer Systems Analyst or Computer Programmer occupations for which this wage determination does not specify an SCA wage rate then the wage rate for that employee must be conformed in accordance with the conformance procedures described in the conformance note included on this wage determination.

Additionally because job titles vary widely and change quickly in the computer industry job titles are not determinative of the application of the computer professional exemption. Therefore the exemption applies only to computer employees who satisfy the compensation requirements and whose primary duty consists of:

- (1) The application of systems analysis techniques and procedures including consulting with users to determine hardware software or system functional specifications;
- (2) The design development documentation analysis creation testing or modification of computer systems or programs including prototypes based on and related to user or system design specifications;
- (3) The design documentation testing creation or modification of computer programs related to machine operating systems; or
- (4) A combination of the aforementioned duties the performance of which requires the same level of skills. (29 C.F.R. 541.400).
- 2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you work at night as part of a regular tour of duty you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

** HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL **

An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance explosives and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening blending dying mixing and pressing of sensitive ordnance explosives and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide black powder and photoflash powder. All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives. Demilitarization modification renovation demolition and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving re-grading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands face or arms of the employee engaged in the operation irritation of the skin minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving unloading storage and hauling of ordnance explosive and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance explosives and incendiary material differential pay.

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract by the employer by the state or local law etc.) the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost) reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of ""wash and wear"" materials may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning daily washing or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract by the contractor by law or by the nature of the work there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

** SERVICE CONTRACT ACT DIRECTORY OF OCCUPATIONS **

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"" Fifth Edition (Revision 1) dated September 2015 unless otherwise indicated.

** REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE Standard Form 1444 (SF-1444) **

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e. the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination) be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e. appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(i)). Such conforming procedures shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)). The Wage and Hour Division shall make a final determination of conformed classification wage rate and/or fringe benefits which shall be paid to all employees performing in the classification from the first day of work on which contract work is performed by them in the classification. Failure to pay such unlisted employees the compensation agreed upon by the interested parties and/or fully determined by the Wage and Hour Division retroactive to the date such class of employees commenced contract work shall be a violation of the Act and this contract. (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(v)). When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract a separate SF-1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award the contractor prepares a written report listing in order the proposed classification title(s) a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s) job description(s) and rationale for proposed wage rate(s) including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved or where there is no authorized representative the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.
- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees to the U.S. Department of Labor Wage and Hour Division for review (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(ii)).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt the Wage and Hour Division approves modifies or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour Division's decision to the contractor.
- 6) Each affected employee shall be furnished by the contractor with a written copy of such determination or it shall be posted as a part of the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(iii)).

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF-1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request the ""Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations"" should be used to compare job definitions to ensure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember it is not the job title but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split combine or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.152(c)(1))."
